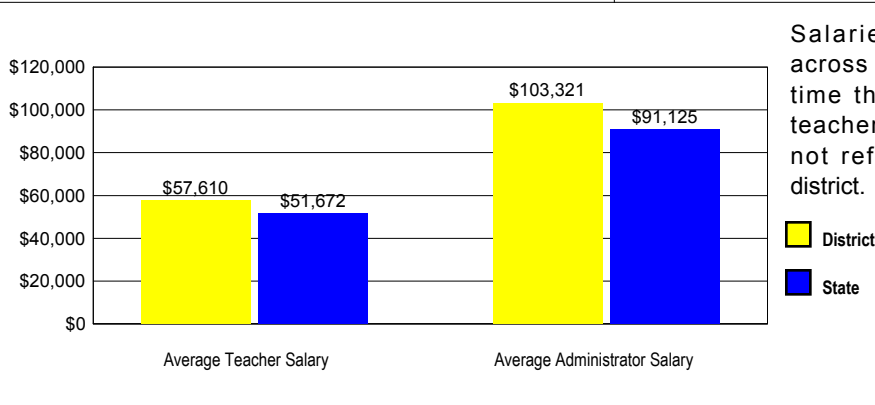

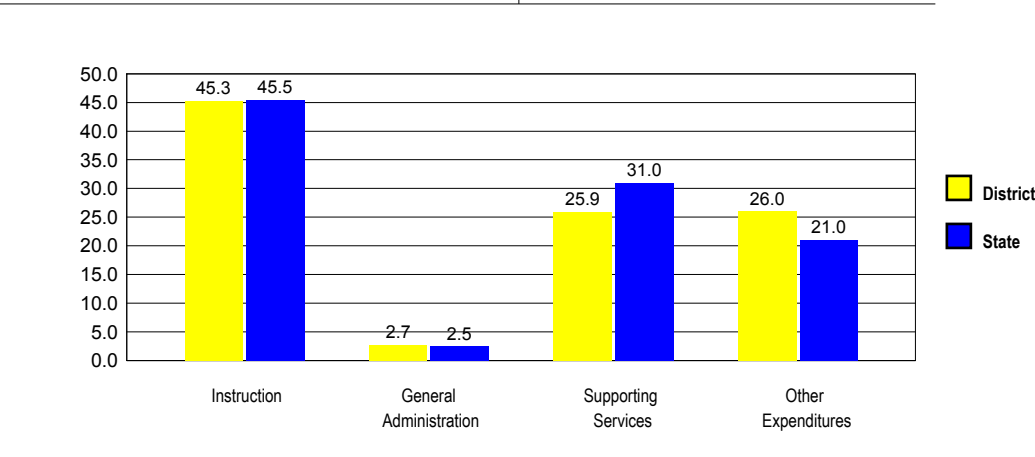
SCHOOL DISTRICT FINANCES

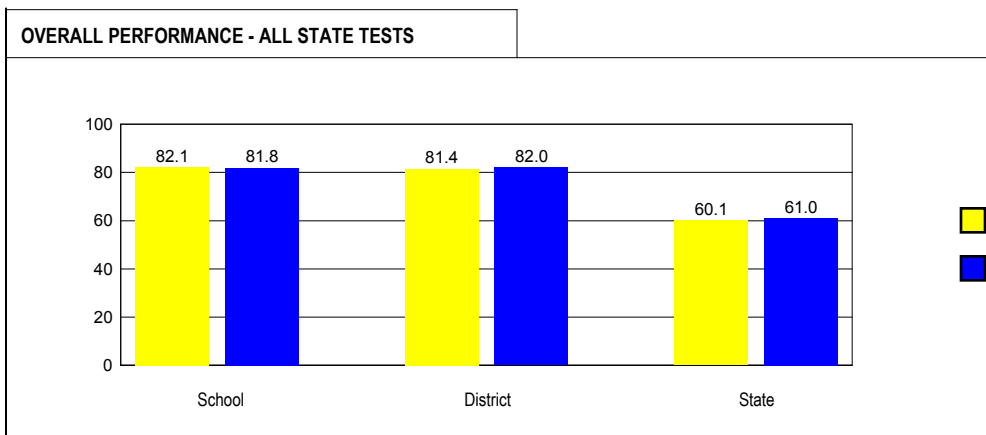

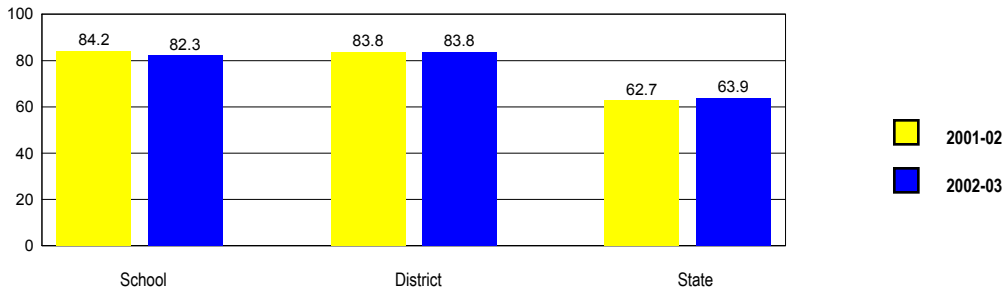

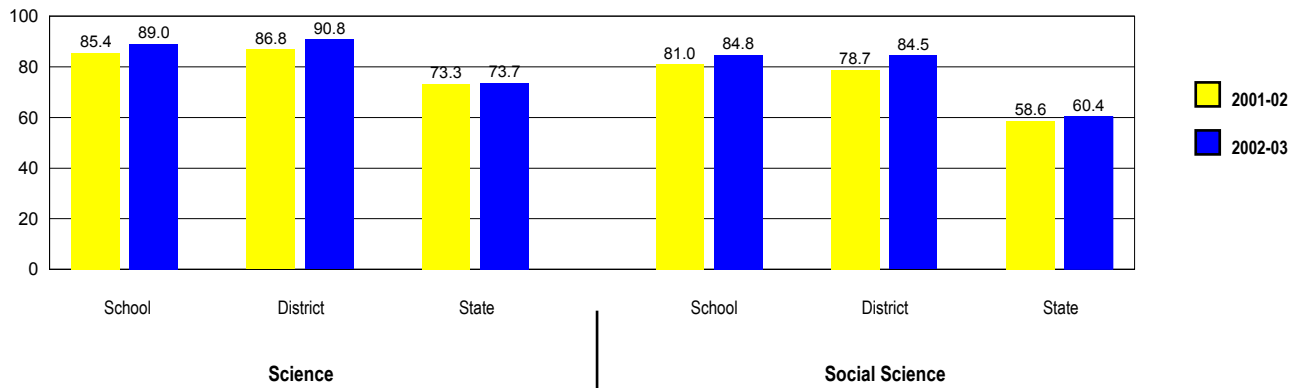
OVERALL ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT) PERFORMANCE



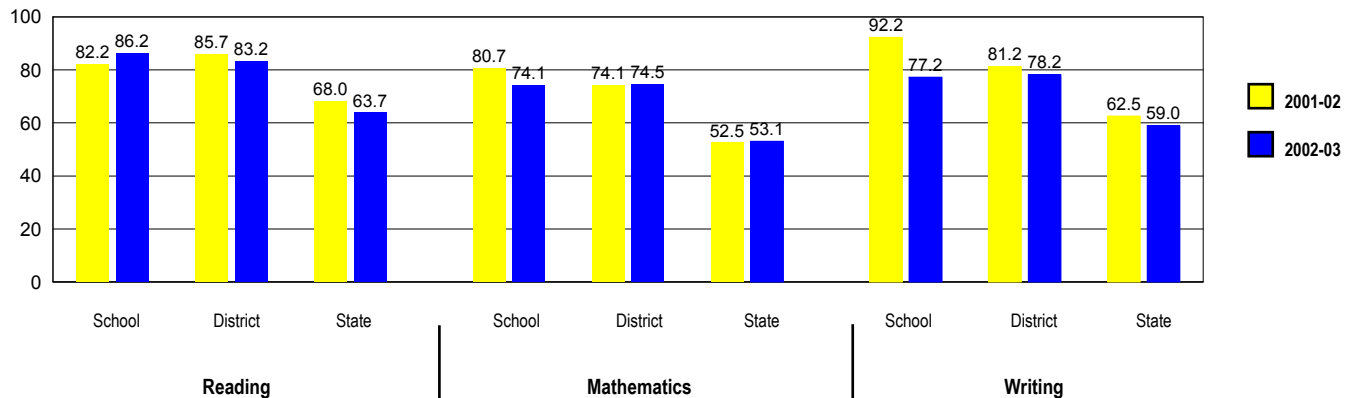

PERFORMANCE ON STATE ASSESSMENTS

Federal law requires that student achievement results for schools providing Title I services be reported to the general public.

The Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) is administered to students in grades 3, 4, 5, 7, and 8. The Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) is administered to students in grade 11. The Illinois Measure of Annual Growth in English (IMAGE) is administered to students in state-approved transitional bilingual programs. The Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) is administered to students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) indicate that participation in the ISAT or PSAE would not be appropriate.

Students with disabilities have an IEP or Section 504 Plan. An IEP is a written plan for a child with a disability who is eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. A Section 504 Plan is developed to provide reasonable accommodations for a child who meets the definition of a qualified person with a disability under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

Schools with grade 2 as the highest grade in the school use a state-adopted test in reading and mathematics to meet this requirement.

In order to protect students' identities, test data for groups of fewer than ten students are not reported.

ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT)

The following tables show the percentages of student scores in each of four performance levels. These levels were established with the help of Illinois educators who teach the grade levels and learning areas tested. Due to rounding, the sum of the percentages in the four performance levels may not always equal 100.

Level 1 -- Academic Warning -	Student work demonstrates limited knowledge and skills in the subject. Because of major gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills ineffectively.
Level 2 -- Below Standards -	Student work demonstrates basic knowledge and skills in the subject. However, because of gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills in limited ways.
Level 3 -- Meets Standards -	Student work demonstrates proficient knowledge and skills in the subject. Students effectively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems.
Level 4 -- Exceeds Standards -	Student work demonstrates advanced knowledge and skills in the subject. Students creatively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems and evaluate the results.

*** Subgroups with fewer than 40 students are not reported. Safe harbor only applies to subgroups. Safe harbor allows schools an alternate method to meet subgroup minimum targets on achievement.

Elm Place Middle School's instructional program is designed to ensure successful academic achievement for students in grades 6-8 to meet or exceed state standards. With highly talented staff, students experience a rich, challenging, academic environment where maximum social and emotional growth occurs. Strong parental and community support significantly contributes to the learning process. Together they create effective school-to-home partnerships that benefit each child's development.

Areas of Success

- There was a 98% rate of parent involvement with the school.
- The faculty and staff and administration maintained and increased community partnerships.
- There was a continued emphasis on character education programs and assemblies.
- Designed an instructional block for 6th grade English/literature/social studies.
- Designed a limited instructional block for 6th grade math/science/study skills.
- Student success as measured on the ISAT results: % students met or exceeded state standards = 74 math 8th grade, 77 writing 8th grade, 85 social science 7th grade, 86 reading 8th grade and 89% science 7th grade.
- Elm Place professional development opportunities for teachers and support staff continued to mirror district 112 strategic objectives.
- Technology usage has increased throughout the classrooms and offices with both instructional and administrative uses.
- The (former) daily advisory program helped meet the needs of children at the middle level.
- Joined the Lakeside Middle School Athletic Conference with sister schools Edgewood and Northwood.
- Systemic professional development: facilitation of group study – middle school philosophy together with Edgewood and Northwood.

Areas for Planned Improvement

- Increase percentages of students who meet and exceed state standards in all areas of the ISAT.
- Evaluate the new structures of teaming while working toward district and building middle school goals.
- Establish a new advisory program.
- Support increased and enhanced instructional block opportunities.
- Increase the level of technology usage throughout the classrooms and offices.
- Continue the revised health education programs grades 6-8.
- Implement a new fitness/wellness program.
- Support curriculum mapping across the grade levels and curriculum areas.
